We increase people's choices through innovations that harness the power of data to benefit communities economically, socially, and environmentally, in support of the 2030 Agenda.


Our vision is to increase opportunity and equity for those most in need through information technology solutions that protect and promote wellbeing in every community.






CSF Impact at a Glance

In the last year, we implemented 45 data-driven development projects and sent \$2.1 million to the field from our sponsors. We completed 14 projects in Africa where we


continued to increase our impact. 12 projects had a global impact.

CSF has developed powerful data-driven systems using the new DFA toolkit, such as, UN Info, EQUIST, and OpenEMIS. These innovations are helping allocate resource and target interventions to reach the most vulnerable first.






OpenEMIS is a high-quality Education Management Information System (EMIS) designed to collect and report data on schools, students, teachers and staff. The system was conceived by UNESCO, and developed by CSF, as a royalty-free system that can be easily customized to meet the specific needs of countries.

EQUIST identifies the most deprived children

EQUIST is a data-driven model that identifies equitable strategies to save lives through deprivation analysis that reveals disparities often masked by aggregate figures. The system shows health planners how to invest in proven cost-effective interventions that optimize the use of available resources.

Long-term Agreements

CSF implements a growing proportion of its programme activities through long-term agreements with its main sponsors. These agreements provide a framework of terms and conditions, valid for a specified time period (usually two to three years), which are concluded between one or more sponsor and CSF for the repeated purchase of specified goods and services at pre-negotiated rates.





The SDG dashboard for Coimbatore has been developed keeping in mind the importance of disseminating data, user interactions and evidence-based decision-making. Key performance indicators have been presented under two core classifications - the SDGs and nine thematic areas. COIMBATORE The indicators considered for the dashboard have evolved primarily from the National Indicator Framework and the relevant city indices (Ease of **SDG DATA** Living, Municipal Performance Index, Climate Smart Cities Assessment Framework and Data PORTAL Maturity Assessment Framework). The dashboard consists data for 105 indicators, covering 404 data points. The indicators with direct linkage to National Indicator Framework (Version 3.0) have been referred to using their relevant indicator number in NIF (Eq: 11.6.3, 2.2.4 etc.)

Community Systems Foundation is proud to share good news from our partners. The Coimbatore SDG dashboard, designed and developed by our technical partner <u>Avalon Information Systems</u> has been included as a good practice in GIZ projects in India under governance and SDGs.
